Legal Cases	<p>Format: <i>Full Case Name</i>. Volume number name of the law reporter containing the case (abbreviated) opening page number (name of court which decided decision and year).</p> <p>*Note: The reporter is the official record of the decision. For Supreme Court decisions, cite <i>United States Supreme Court Reports</i> (abbreviated U.S.). For federal-court decisions, cite <i>Federal Reporter (F.)</i> or <i>Federal Supplement (F. Supp.)</i>. Cite official state reporters whenever possible for state or local decisions. When citing Supreme Court decisions, no additional details about the court need to be included beyond the reporter.</p> <p>Sample Citations: <i>Miranda v. Arizona</i>. 384 U.S. 436 (1966). <i>Glenn v. The State</i>. 296 Ga. 509 (2015).</p>
Presidential Publications	<p>Format: US President. Year of action. Document type and number. "Title" <i>Publication</i> volume, issue number (Publication dates): Page Numbers.</p> <p>*Note: Some publication information may vary, depending on the source. Please refer to the official Turabian Guide (found in your campus library) to be sure information is correct.</p> <p>Sample Citation: US President. 2015. Proclamation 9253. "National Volunteer Week, 2015." <i>Code of Federal Regulations</i>, title 3 (2015 comp.): 47-48.</p>
Congressional Bills and Resolutions	<p>Format: Legislative Body. Division of Legislature. Year of action. Title of document. Originating house abbreviation and subsequent information. <i>Congressional Record</i> edition (date of publication): page numbers.</p> <p>*Note: Include <i>Congressional Record</i> information if it is available. If a bill has been enacted, cite it as a statute (see next box).</p> <p>Sample Citation: US Congress. House. 2015. Fairness for High-Skilled Immigrants Act of 2015. H. Res. 213. 114th Cong., 1st sess.</p>
Congressional Statutes	<p>Format: Title of Statute. Public Law Number. Congressional number., session. Date.</p> <p>Sample Citation:</p>
